From Father Kasel

Praised be Jesus Christ through Mary!

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ Jesus,

This month of February is dedicated to increasing our devotion to the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph, and to imitate their practice of everyday holiness. May the Holy Family help us each day to strive to be Saints in the service of our good Lord Jesus and His Kingdom! This Sunday, February 2, we celebrate the Presentation of the Our Lord in the Temple. This is a beautiful feast! For this occasion, I include the Gospel reading (Luke 2:22-40) from Holy Mass for February 2 and a homily from St. Sophronius, Bishop, about the meaning of this special feast:

Luke 2:22-40

"When the days were completed for their purification according to the law of Moses, they took him up to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord, just as it is written in the law of the Lord, 'Every male that opens the womb shall be consecrated to the Lord,' and to offer the sacrifice of 'a pair of turtledoves or two young pigeons,' in accordance with the dictate in the law of the Lord.

Now there was a man in Jerusalem whose name was Simeon. This man was righteous and devout, awaiting the consolation of Israel, and the holy Spirit was upon him. It had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he should not see death before he had seen the Messiah of the Lord. He came in the Spirit into the temple; and when the parents brought in the child Jesus to perform the custom of the law in regard to him, he took him into his arms and blessed God, saying:

word, for my eyes have seen your salvation, which you prepared in sight of all the peoples, a light for revelation to the Gentiles, and glory for your people Israel."

The child's father and mother were amazed at what was said about him; and Simeon blessed them and said to Mary his mother, 'Behold, this child is destined for the fall and rise of many in Israel, and to be a sign that will be contradicted (and you yourself a sword will pierce) so that the thoughts of many hearts may be revealed.' There was also a prophetess, Anna, the daughter of Phanuel, of the tribe of Asher. She was advanced in years, having lived seven years with her husband after her marriage, and then as a widow until she was eighty-four. She never left the temple, but worshiped night and day with fasting and prayer. And coming forward at that very time, she gave thanks to God and spoke about the child to all who were awaiting the redemption of Jerusalem. When they had fulfilled all the prescriptions of the law of the Lord, they returned to Galilee, to their own town of Nazareth. The child grew and became strong, filled with wisdom; and the favor of God was upon him."

From a homily by St. Sophronius:

"In honor of the Divine Mystery that we celebrate today, let us all hasten to meet Christ. Everyone should be eager to join the procession and to carry a light.

Our lighted candles are a sign of the Divine Splendor of the One who comes to expel the dark shadows of evil and to make the whole universe radiant with the brilliance of His Eternal Light. Our candles also show how bright our souls should be when we go to meet Christ.

Where sin abounded, Grace has more abounded "Where can the weak find a place of firm security and peace, except in the wounds of the Savior? Indeed, the more secure is my place there the more He can do to help me. The world rages, the flesh is heavy, and the devil lays his snares, but I do not fall, for my feet are planted on firm rock. I may have sinned gravely. My conscience would be distressed, but it would not be in turmoil, for I would recall the wounds of the Lord: He was wounded for our iniquities. What sin is there so deadly that it cannot be pardoned by the death of Christ? And so if I bear in mind this strong, effective remedy, I can never again be terrified by the malignancy of sin. Surely the man who said: My sin is too great to merit pardon, was wrong. He was speaking as though he were not a member of Christ and had no share in His merits, so that he could claim them as his own, as a member of the body can claim what belongs to the head. As for me, what can I appropriate that I lack from the Heart of the Lord who abounds in Mercy? They pierced His hands and feet and opened His side with a spear. Through the openings of these wounds I may drink honey from the rock and oil from the hardest stone: that is, I may taste and see that the Lord is sweet. He was thinking thoughts of peace, and I did not know it, for who knows the mind of the Lord, or who has been His counselor? But the piercing nail has become a key to unlock the door, that I may see the Good Will of the Lord. And what can I see as I look through the hole? Both the nail and the wound cry out that God was in Christ reconciling the world to Himself. The sword pierced His Soul and came close to His Heart, so that He might be able to feel compassion for me in my weaknesses.

Through these Sacred Wounds we can see the secret of His Heart, the great mystery of Love, the sincerity of His Mercy with which He visited us from on high. Where have your Love, your Mercy, your compassion shone out more luminously than in your wounds, sweet, gentle Lord of Mercy? More Mercy than this no one has than that He lay down His life for those who are doomed to death. My merit comes from His Mercy; for I do not lack merit so long as He does not lack pity. And if the Lord's Mercies are many, then I am rich in merits. For even if I am aware of many sins, what does it matter? Where sin abounded Grace has overflowed. And if the Lord's Mercies are from all ages forever, I too will sing of the Mercies of the Lord forever. Will I not sing of my own righteousness? No, Lord, I shall be mindful only of Your justice. Yet that too is my own; for God has made You my righteousness." (From a sermon on the Song of Songs by St. Bernard, abbot)

Let all of us, my brethren, be enlightened and made radiant by this Light. Let all of us share in Its splendor and be so filled with It that no one remains in the darkness. Let us be shining ourselves as we go together to meet and to receive with the aged Simeon the Light whose brilliance is eternal. Rejoicing with Simeon, let us sing a hymn of thanksgiving to God, the Father of the Light, who sent the true Light to dispel the darkness and to give us all a share in His splendor.

Through Simeon's eyes we too have seen the salvation of God which He prepared for all the nations and revealed as the glory of the new Israel, which is ourselves. As Simeon was released from the bonds of this life when he had seen Christ, so we too were at once freed from our old state of sinfulness.

By Faith we too embraced Christ, the Salvation of God the Father, as He came to us from Bethlehem. Gentiles before, we have now become the People of God. Our eyes have seen God incarnate, and because we have seen Him present among us and have mentally received Him into our arms, we are called the new Israel. Never shall we forget this presence; every year we keep a Feast in His honor."
